

Components of an RSC College Nomination

- A cover letter from the nominator (1 page)
- Citation (maximum 70 words)
- Detailed Appraisal (maximum 1200 words)
- Candidate's Statement (maximum 500 words)
- Two letters of reference (maximum 750 words)
- A brief biography of each referee (maximum 250 words)
- A CV (maximum 10 pages)

Tips for Developing a Strong RSC College Nomination

- With your divisional awards coordinator, draft the **Detailed Appraisal** (1200 words max.) prior to sending it to your nominator.
 - Use structuring elements like bold and subheadings.
 - Write in non-technical language for a multidisciplinary audience.
- At least a month before the deadline, provide your writers with two letters of reference with your CV and bullet points for suggested achievements to include.
 - Use action/result statements: "She developed a new theory which resulted in XXX," or "She developed a product that changed XYZ.
- In the Candidate's Statement (500 words max.), discuss two outreach/impact activities resulting from your research
 - Use quantitative data to address your claims, if possible.

Preparing your nomination package

Primary Nominator letter - from a FRSC

Co-nominator letters (form letter)

Citation (70 words - two official languages)

Detailed appraisal (describe your achievements to a non-specialist audience of scholars)

Referee letters (max 3 pages - from well renowned scholars - need to use language of excellence) - at UTSC, we are using an iterative process going back and forth between referee and OVPRI

biographical sketches (V 4 page)

CV (max 50 pages - sell yourself)



How does the process work?

Your package is received at the RSC office in Ottawa... then goes to evaluation committee...

An evaluation committee representing your academy reads and scores and compares to other nominations. Committee memberships are posted.

What is important?

The evaluation committee forwards the strongest nominations to all fellows of the specific academy for voting.

What sets you apart from other nominations?

Key are YOUR detailed appraisal, YOUR CV, and letters from referees.

Presenting information in your detailed appraisal that allow the committee to gauge your standing within your area of academic expertise is important.

Letters from referees need to be specific. The referee needs to be someone with a significant standing within your academic community - someone on the top of her game, major award winners, people of influence...)



Other issues...



Get started early...

Read the instructions / Know the rules and regulations (e.g. space/word limits)

Understand the pieces that are needed



There are undoubtedly people around you with different strengths and experiences. Use them! Pass around drafts and solicit feedback/advice. Talk to your research office in your division/campus.
